ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT SEPTEMBER 2013 Incident Report



The Brigade attended two road crashes during the month. One in particular was on the notorious Snake Gully Road which has its regular road crashes. As we mention on many occasions the need to take care and drive at safe speeds, especially in the wet conditions that we have been experiencing lately. In addition the Brigade attended a caravan fire, the van was unfortunately totally destroyed.

Reminders

Spring has arrived and Summer is on the way!

Preparing your property for bushfire attack should start well before the fire danger season begins. There are measures that can be taken; here are some.

- a: Slash or mow long grass and remove cut material, within 20 metres of the home.
- b: Remove weeds around sheds and fences.
- c: Cut back trees overhanging the roof.
- d: Remove fallen branches and other debris.
- e: Check and service all mechanical equipment including grass cutters, water pumps, sprinkler systems and fire extinguishers
- f: Remove leaves from gutters.
- g: Spray along fence lines to protect fences from fire.
- h: Review and update your Bushfire Action Plan.

Councillor's Report September

Council will be looking at the number of Councillors within each ward, the number of wards and the way the residents are represented in the near future. Council has abandoned the draft proposal on ward representations until after the elections when we will have an updated electoral role and a clearer indication of the number of residents in the Council Area.

Council has been spending a large amount of energy on its submission to the Minister for Planning on developing its position on the implementation of the Ministerial 30 year Plan. Council staff are encouraging elected members to support a position where they will negotiate individual contracts with land owners obligating them to pay for infrastructure and stormwater drainage along with other previously developer and taxpayer funded costs or they won't have their land rezoned. This is (in my opinion) immoral and unequitable and I could use other words that might get me in big trouble (like if you had mail and it got burnt what colour mail would you have?). More after Tuesday night's meeting. I must say that given Council's (staff) position, I am ashamed to, in this case say, that I am an elected member of the City of Playford.

If you are uncomfortable with council viewing your comments then please e-mail me at jfederico@internode.on.net if subsequent to that approach you do not receive a timely or satisfactory result please feel free to contact me personally.

However I cannot guarantee that I will be able to get any better results but will at least have council reassess their position and provide an explanation as to their resolve and in some cases if not most, reach a compromise that is acceptable to all parties concerned. Horse Care - Saddle Fitting Part 2—The Rider

We touched last month on the size of the saddle being to suit the rider's butt. This is the seat size. On English saddles, it is measured from the screw, which is just to the left of the pommel, to the centre of the cantle. In Stock Saddles it is measured from the centre of the pommel to the centre of the cantle. In general, this will result in half an inch difference, i.e. an English 17 inch is a stock 16½ inch. Saddles start at 12 inch and go to 18 inch.

Obviously, the rider needs a saddle big enough to hold their butt. It not only looks ugly, but it is bad for the horse's back to have overflow. The weight is not distributed properly. But too big a saddle can be detrimental too. A small person in a big saddle slides around and will feel insecure, as well as confuse the horse due to excessive movement. Some instructors say you need to be able to move in the saddle, but most horses would prefer it if we do not move. Movement confuses them. It interferes with their reading of our body cues. However, there needs to be some looseness to allow muscle readjustment as we give the cues or move to the movement of the horse.

The seat of the saddle needs to be level, when fitted to the horse. If the seat slopes forward, the rider is constantly trying to push themselves backwards. They will brace their feet and legs forward. This will make it very difficult to ride in balance with the horse. But the seat that slopes backwards puts the rider's legs forward, making it almost impossible to rise trot. A saddle may be level on one horse and sloping on another, yet still appear to fit elsewhere. This is due to the different slope of the horses' back from wither to hips.

The twist is the width of the saddle immediately in front of the rider, where it rises to a narrowing pinch. I have heard the statement that it has a "nice narrow twist" but women need a wide twist. The shape of the pelvic bones in women mean that narrow twists actually allow the saddle to sit inside the seat bones, causing major rubbing of sensitive areas.

Children and men need narrow twists: they do not have the pelvic spread. Mothers need wider twists than maidens.

The flaps of the saddle are there to keep your trousers/jodhs clean from horse sweat. But if they are so long that your legs do not contact the horse, you will be unable to give effective aids with your legs. They should come down about half way between our knees and ankles, higher rather than lower. This is one of the major problems with dressage saddles: they nearly all have long flaps which interfere with short legged riders.

The stirrup bars are under the skirt and hold the stirrup leathers (even if they are made of synthetic, they are still called leathers). Bars that are too far forward take your leg forward. This will interfere with your balance, especially in rising trot. But they need to be forward if you are jumping. The higher the jump, the more you need to bend your legs to take your weight forward to assist the jump (within limits). Tiny jumps, where the horse barely bends his knees, do not require short stirrups and forward bars. So the position of the bars is dependent on what you are doing with your horse. You may need 2 saddles if you do a lot of flat riding as well as lots of jumping. Serious 3 day eventers have 3 saddles, one for each phase, as they each require specialist saddles to suit the action.

When choosing a saddle, we can sit in one at the Saddlery. We can check if it fits us in these important areas. Then we have to get it fitted to our horse. If he is not comfortable he will make our ride more uncomfortable.

Next issue: making adjustable saddles fit our horse.

Please continue to take note of what is happening in your local area and become involved by way of writing down registration numbers of vehicles which appear 'out of place' and 'loitering' in an area which to you seems unusual.

Reminder to the public to check the credentials of businesses who carry out work such as road sealing, roof repairs etc. Potential for fraud.

On November 9th 2012, Commissioner of Consumer Affairs issued the following statement.

The Deputy Commissioner for Consumer Affairs Dini Soulio has reminded South Australians to remain vigilant this summer and keep an eye out for people posing as tradespeople who offer great deals but fail to deliver. The growth in travelling con men scams involving bitumen laying, roof painting and back of truck deals on electrical goods has led to development of a national strategy to raise public awareness and stop the scammers in their tracks. "Travelling con men typically use State and Territory borders to escape detection by authorities," Mr Soulio said. "For this reason, the Australian State and Territory consumer protection agencies have joined forces to stop the scams spreading and bring the offenders before the courts. 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Chilean Needle Grass Awakening

Chilean Needle Grass (*Nassella neesiana*) season is almost upon us and now is the time for landholders to gear up for control.

Chilean Needle Grass (CNG) is a tussock grass which can be identified by its red-purple, drooping seed heads, needle-like seeds and the presence of asexual 'seeds' in its stem and its base. It can spread rapidly, infesting productive land and native bush in its wake. In one season a single plant can produce up to 28,000 seeds. Care needs to be taken to identify the grass correctly. Native spear grasses have similar seeds and some have a drooping form so they look very similar but are not a threat.

Chilean Needle Grass is a Weed of National Significance and has significant economic ramifications for landholders and primary producers and endangers the welfare of livestock.

The City of Playford and Natural Resources, Adelaide & Mt Lofty Ranges has joined forces with the community in activities to contain and control current known infestations and reduce risk of further spread. The One Tree Hill Chilean Needle Grass Community Group formed three years ago to promote awareness of the problem and help instigate control strategies. Trials of management regimes and their affect on Council verge mowing program for rural roads has been modified for some hills roads to accommodate for the timing of survey and control of CNG during October—December. You may be concerned with longer grass on some roads but be assured these roads will be mown prior to and ready for the bush fire season once CNG control activities are completed.

Natural Resources, Adelaide & Mt Lofty Ranges is mapping the extent of CNG annually and controlling roadside outbreaks along with assisting private landholders with identification and provision of advice on control options.

We will be seeking the cooperation of the community to work with us in our efforts to combat this weed. Preferred bushfire prevention mowing in districts with known infestations of CNG is to slash early September and again in late November or early December. This allows CNG to develop flowers from October—November for identification and for weed control to be applied prior to second slashing. Slashing during CNG seeding period **November—February** will risk further spread if plants are not controlled.

Control requests landholders to refrain from mowing road verges during this critical time. Please be reminded that any mowing or alterations on roadsides requires permission to be obtained from Council in accordance with the Local Government Act 1999.

Also some roadsides contain rare and sensitive patches of remnant native plants and Council takes care to conserve them in their roadside vegetation maintenance programs. If you wish to mow your road verge outside of CNG control time please contact :

Carnage on our Roads

Spring is here! It seems to be the silly season. Drivers who have been out for a late night and are still tired in the morning, sometimes running late and then driving too fast.

Deaths start to mount up.

Country roads are more often involved with deaths than city roads; speed kills.

I beg you; slow down. It will only cost a moment and may save a life.

It is now that the young magpies start to learn to fly. They are not as quick as their parents, nor as good at judging distances and speed of cars. In cool weather, birds do not warm up and are slow to move. Every year we see dozens on the sides of the roads. I watch with anguish as their parents and siblings stand around the corpse, hoping they will get up.

It is now that the sleepy/stumpy lizards come out for their early feeds. They are slow as their bodies are not yet warm enough to allow fast movement. Give them a moment to cross the road.

I am not asking you to swerve; that could lead to your death. Just lift your foot off the accelerator. It is often enough for the little ones to get out of the way.

The winding part of Snake Gully is about 10 km long. At 80 km/hour, it takes 7½ minutes. At 70 kpm, it takes 8½. Is your day so busy that you cannot spare 1 minute for the creatures that share our country? Then why are you living in the country? Go back to suburbia where you will have 50kph and 60kph zones and no wildlife.

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Cleaning Your Baking Trays

Do you have some baking trays that you just can't get clean?
We are all probably guilty of having at least one tray or baking dish
that we just can't get clean even though you spent ages trying to
scrub it.

This is a tried and tested method to remove the toughest marks on
your trays or perhaps baking dish.

Place about a quarter of a cup of Baking Soda in a small glass bowl
and squirt in hydrogen peroxide to make a nice paste.

Rub this paste into the offending
stain/grease with a small sponge.
Leave to soak overnight if possible
and then rinse, they should come up
sparkling clean.

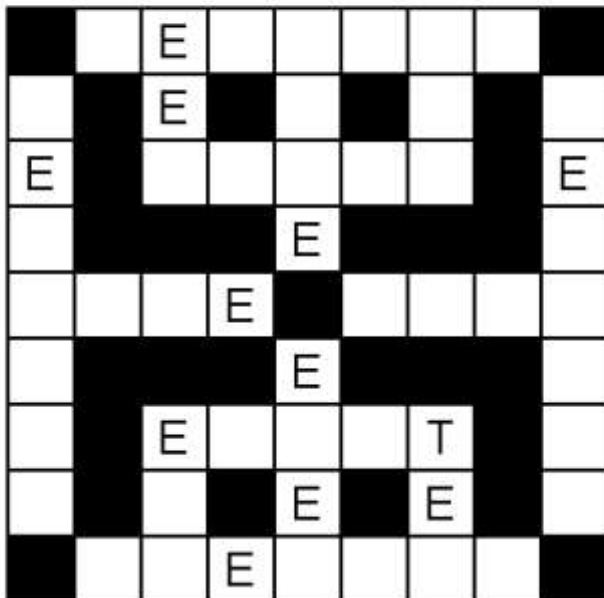
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CROSS-WISE

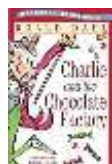

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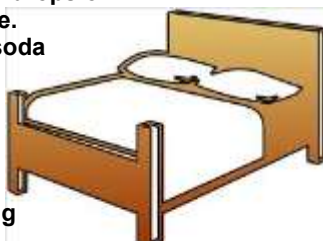
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CLEAN YOUR MATTRESS

Loaded Potato and Chicken Casserole

Ingredients:

1 kg of boneless chicken breasts, cubed (1")
8-10 medium potatoes, cut into 1" cubes
One third of a cup of olive oil
1 & ½ Teaspoons salt,
1 Tablespoon of black pepper
1 Tablespoon paprika,
1 Teaspoon mixed herbs
2 tablespoons garlic powder or fresh garlic
6 Tablespoons hot sauce (Worcestershire is good)

Topping:

Shredded cheese (approximately cup and ½)
1 cup of diced bacon
1 cup of diced green onion (Shallots)

Preheat oven to 220°. Spray a baking dish with cooking spray or wipe over with a little olive oil. In a large bowl mix together the olive oil, salt, pepper, paprika, garlic powder and hot sauce. Add the cubed potatoes and stir to coat. Carefully scoop the potatoes into the prepared baking dish, leaving behind as much of the olive oil/hot sauce mixture as possible. Bake the potatoes for 40mins stirring every 10-15minutes, until cooked through and crispy and browned on the outside. While the potatoes are cooking, add the cubed chicken to the bowl with the left over sauce mixture and stir to coat. Once the potatoes are fully cooked, remove from the oven and lower the temperature to 200°. Top the cooked potatoes with the raw marinated chicken. In a bowl mix together the cheese, bacon and green onion and top the raw chicken with the cheese mixture. Return the casserole to the oven and bake for 15-20 minutes or until chicken is cooked through and the topping is bubbling.

Serves 4 people. The kids are sure to love this one.
Add to the marinade with fresh garlic or herbs if desired.

NUISANCE PHONE CALLS

Nuisance phone calls, sometimes referred to as menacing, harassing or unwelcome calls, are included in Commonwealth legislation (Section 474.17 of the Commonwealth Criminal Code). The legislation states: 'When a person uses a 'carrier service' and does so in a way (whether by method of use or the content of a communication, or both) that reasonable persons would regard as being, in all the circumstances, menacing, harassing or offensive'.

Police offer the following advice if you become a victim of nuisance or menacing phone calls.

- ♦ Liaise with your telephone company about any unwelcome call issues - most service providers have procedures in place for this type of incident.
- ♦ Take your phone off the hook if calls are intermittent.
- ♦ Change your phone number.
- ♦ Screen your calls - with an answering machine or voicemail.
- ♦ Be selective with who you give your number to - only trusted friends and family.
- ♦ Do not publicly list your phone number - utilise a silent number.
- ♦ Subscribe to 'caller ID' or 'call number display' to ascertain who is calling and screen unknown callers.
- ♦ Block the ability for your phone to receive SMS through your service provider.
- ♦ If you are aware of or suspect the number the calls are coming from, you may be able to subscribe to a service called 'call forward selected callers'. This service will forward calls from the selected number prior to reaching your phone.
- ♦ Let an expected unwelcome call go unanswered and use the 'Call return' option*10# to ascertain the phone number the call came from.
- ♦ Obtain advice from your service provider either via phone or internet - this may involve getting information about a trace on your line to obtain possible evidence in any possible proceedings.
- ♦ Subscribe to a 'do not call' telemarketing register.
- ♦ Hang up on the persistent caller, or leave your phone off the hook.



If you receive nuisance phone calls, first contact your service provider. They will provide advice about what to do in your situation. If your service provider believes it is necessary to arrange a trace on your phone, they will do so and advise if and when it is necessary for you to report the matter to police.

The easiest way to find something lost around the house is to buy a replacement.



USES FOR DENTAL FLOSS

For many people, dental floss is a helpful friend which regularly aids in removing food particles from your teeth, therefore, cleaning both the teeth and the mouth and keeping decay at bay. Bananas - Not only do they taste good but they are good for you too!
